


Mission Statement

Natural Landscapes for Tomorrow

Grant Program

The Natural Landscapes for Tomorrow grants program, established in the fall of 2000, supports schools, houses of worship, and other public and nonprofit organizations in the Fox Valley Area of Wisconsin for projects involving the creation of natural landscapes and outdoor classrooms using native plants.

Grants awarded range from \$100 to \$500. Award amounts are based on the judges' ranking of the project in comparison to all applications received, and the available funds. Projects that do not receive a grant may be resubmitted for future funding.

Requirements

Applicant must:

- Represent a school, house of worship, or other public or nonprofit organization in the Fox Valley area of Wisconsin (within 15 miles of Winnebago, Calumet, Outagamie or Fond du Lac counties).
- Provide matching funds equal to at least 50% of the cost of the project. Funds can be from the applicant's own treasury, fundraisers or from grants secured from other sources. A budget is required.
- Propose a project that emphasizes community or youth involvement and increases the educational value of the site. Site must be accessible to the public.
- Use native plants appropriate to the site and teach about natural landscapes.

To Apply

Include a brief summary of the project, an environmental assessment, a project narrative, before and after sketches, and a project budget.

Eligible costs include native flowers and forbs, grasses, trees, shrubs, and native plant seed.

Grants do not pay for consultant fees, birdseed, fuel, equipment or labor, books, signage, and land acquisition.

Grant applications must be submitted electronically or postmarked by February 1. Recipients notified by March 7.
